- Imposes term limits on members of the Emerald Coast Utilities
 Authority (ECUA), provides requirements for filling vacancies on the
 board, revises personnel appeals process & procedure, and revises the
 qualifications for executive director.
- CS/838 (HB 557) Fire Investigator Cancer Treatment Benefits
- Revises the definition of the term "firefighter" to include full-time, Florida-certified fire investigators to expand eligibility for certain cancer treatment benefits to include these individuals.
